

# Sometimes, You Must Substitute

Recently one of my sons was commenting that there seems to be no middle ground regarding COVID-19.

He said (more or less) that either you're hunkered down in your bunker or you're blatantly ignoring any and all suggestions. I initially felt that it was a big brouhaha over a seemingly localized to China problem.

My views on the matter have shifted with time. I haven't bought a HAZMAT suit, but the uncertainty of everything can definitely be trying.

This evening I went into our local grocery store. The extent to which the shelves were picked over in several areas was disconcerting. Comfort foods in trying times can be reassuring.

The powers that be asked for me to include several recipes in this week's column. There is no rhyme or reason to them other than they are ones I set aside recently while searching for recipes to use in the column.

Feel free to use substitutions if you find an ingredient is not on your shelves. For example, in the first recipe, it calls for fresh chives. I love the taste of chives, but I typically substitute dried chives. FYI: use dried spices in a 1:3 ration to fresh. For example, use 2 teaspoons of dried chives instead of 2 tablespoons of fresh chives.

**HEARTY CORN FRITTATA**  
Serves 6  
12 large eggs  
1 can (14.75 ounces) cream-style corn  
6 cooked bacon slices, crumbled  
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh chives  
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk together all ingredients in a large bowl until well incorporated. Pour mixture into a 10-inch ovenproof nonstick skillet. Bake in oven until lightly browned and set in the center, about 30 to 35 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes; cut into 6 wedges.

**CREAMED MUSHROOMS**

Serves 8  
3 pounds sliced fresh mushrooms  
1/2 cup butter, cubed  
1/2 cup all-purpose flour  
2 1/2 cups milk  
1 cup evaporated milk  
2 teaspoons salt

Place mushrooms in a large kettle; cover with water. Bring to a boil; stir. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 3 minutes or until tender. Drain well. In a Dutch oven, melt butter. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually add milk and evaporated milk. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Stir in salt and mushrooms. Cook and stir over medium heat for 3 to 4 minutes or until heated through.

**GLAZED JULIENNED CARROTS**  
Serves 8  
2 pounds carrots, julienned  
1/2 cup butter, cubed  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 teaspoon salt

In a large skillet, combine all ingredients. Cover and cook over medium heat for 7-10 minutes or until carrots are crisp-tender.

Serve with a slotted spoon.

**FAVORITE BAKED SPAGHETTI**  
Serves 10  
1 package (16 ounces) spaghetti  
1 pound ground beef  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 jar (24 ounces) spaghetti sauce  
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt  
2 large eggs  
1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
5 tablespoons butter, melted  
2 cups cottage cheese  
4 cups shredded mozzarella cheese

Cook spaghetti according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in spaghetti sauce and seasoned salt; set aside. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs, Parmesan cheese and butter. Drain spaghetti; add to egg mixture and toss to coat. Place half of the spaghetti mixture in a greased 13x9-inch or 3-quart baking dish. Top with half of the cottage cheese, meat sauce and mozzarella cheese. Repeat layers.

## LAW BRIEFS

**Decorah Man Sentenced**  
A man has been given seven years in prison on two sexually-related crimes.

Drake Alexander Jay Duffield, of Decorah, entered guilty pleas and was sentenced in Winneshiek County District Court for two felonies.

With a charge of assault with intent to commit sexual abuse, Duffield received a \$625 fine suspended and two years in prison.

He also received a sentence for enticing a minor under 16 of a \$750 fine suspended and seven years in prison.

The charges stem from 2017.

Duffield was also sentenced on a guilty plea to assault causing bodily injury or mental illness, with the original offense in 2019, to a \$315 fine and 10 days in jail.

**Harn Draws 10 Years**

David Lee Harn, of Decorah, received 10 years in prison after guilty pleas to multiple offenses.

With felony charges of robbery – first degree and robbery – second degree, he received a sentence of a \$1,000 fine suspended on both and 10 years in prison.

An aggravated misdemeanor charge of keeping vehicle or premises for a controlled substance violation drew a \$625 fine suspended and two years in prison.

A serious misdemeanor charge of possession of a controlled substance (marijuana) – first degree drew a \$315 fine suspended and 180 days in jail.

**Woman Faces Multiple Charges**

A report of a suspicious person March 3 resulted in one individual facing at least two felony charges as well as additional misdemeanor charges.

At 10:14 a.m., the Fayette County Sheriff's Office responded to the area of N Avenue and 80th Street on a report of a suspicious vehicle at a private residence. A deputy located the vehicle and made contact with the driver, Tonya Marie Moritz, 29, of Hazleton. With Moritz having a valid arrest warrant of Fayette County for failure to appear/contempt of court, deputies also located several items of drug paraphernalia and 30 grams of methamphetamine in the vehicle. She was transported to the Fayette County Jail and charged with possession of a controlled substance with the intent to deliver, a Class "B" felony; driving while license suspended, a simple misdemeanor; failure to provide proof of financial liability, a simple misdemeanor; possession of drug paraphernalia, a simple misdemeanor; and possession of a controlled substance in a correctional facility, a Class "D" felony.
